In fact, Enbridge has been a partner of DUC since 1986, and has donated close to \$800,000 to DUC conservation and education efforts across Canada. Their most recent gift to DUC helped complete two key enhancement and improvement projects, and one key wetland restoration:

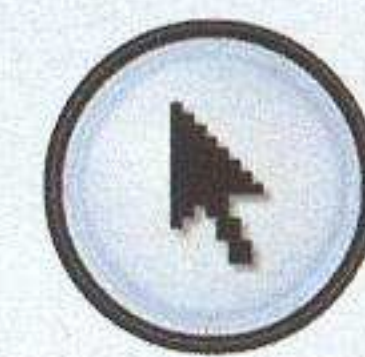
- 1 The Wetthuhn Project located near Killam, Alta., was originally completed in 1972. With funding from Enbridge, DUC replaced the aging structure last summer to ensure the habitat remains healthy and intact for at least another 40 years.
- 2 A trail at the McKell Wascana Conservation Park in Regina will be completed and named for Enbridge this coming summer. Enbridge funding provides much needed support for this unique urban natural area first opened by Prince Philip in 2005.
- 3 Enbridge funding will provide for improvements to wetlands at Wawanosh Wetlands Conservation Area (above left) near Sarnia, Ont. This public park boasts a 2.5-kilometre nature trail that winds along the marsh, featuring colourful and informative interpretive signs.



Celebrating a partnership's major milestones

The Government of Canada is a major partner of Ducks Unlimited Canada (DUC). Through the Natural Areas Conservation Program (NACP), a federal funding source, DUC successfully secured over 120,000 acres of land in the past four years.
